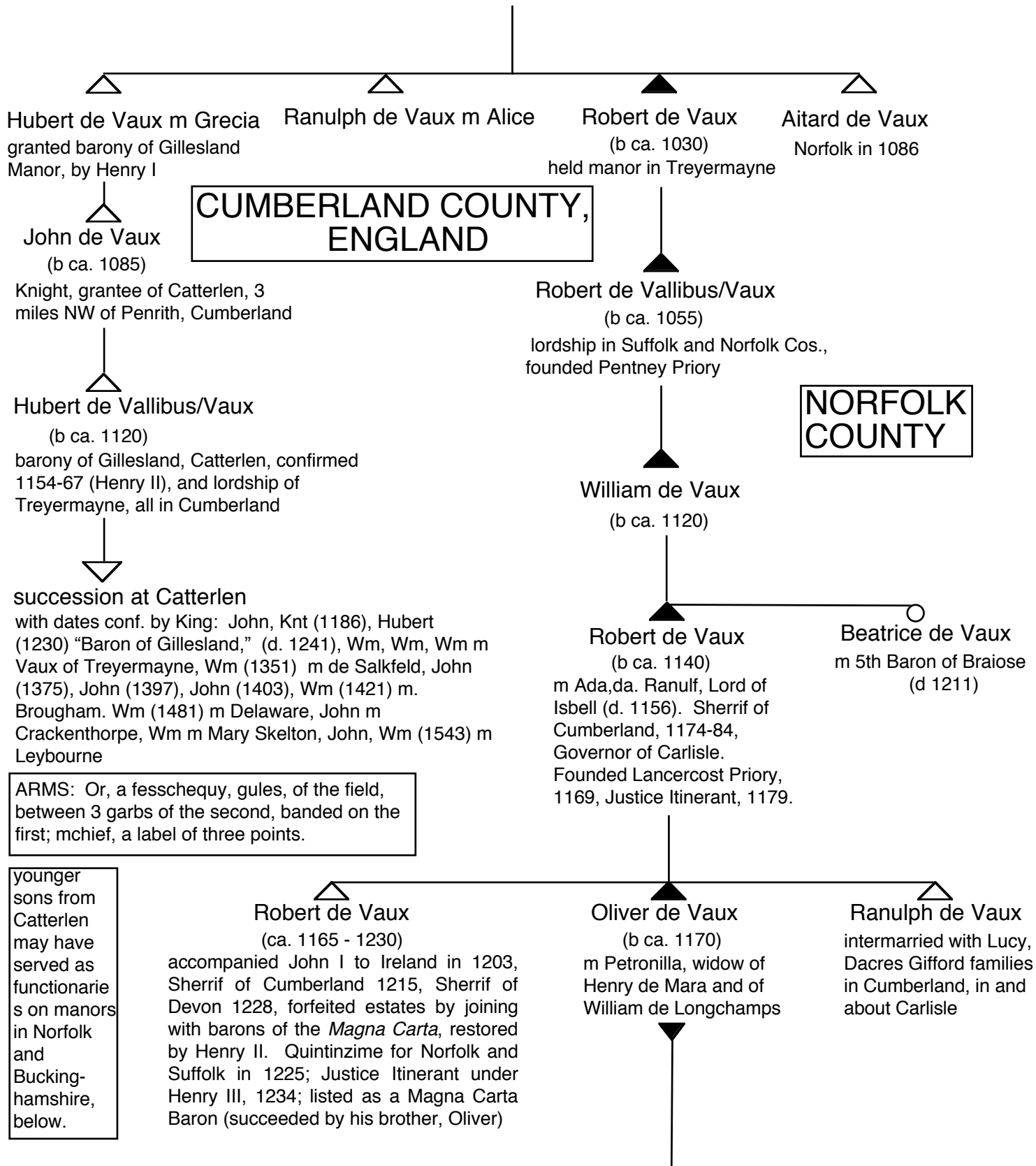

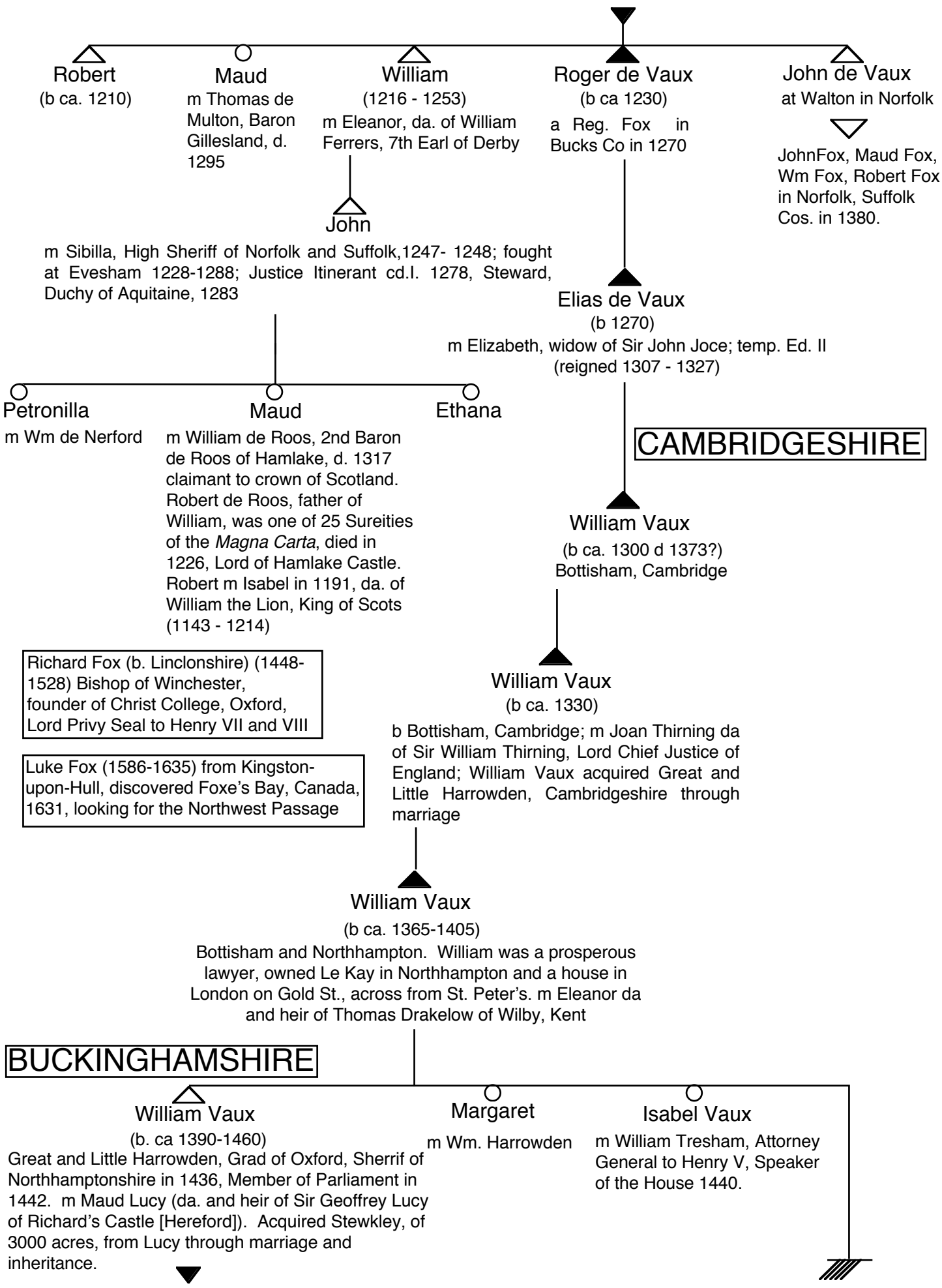

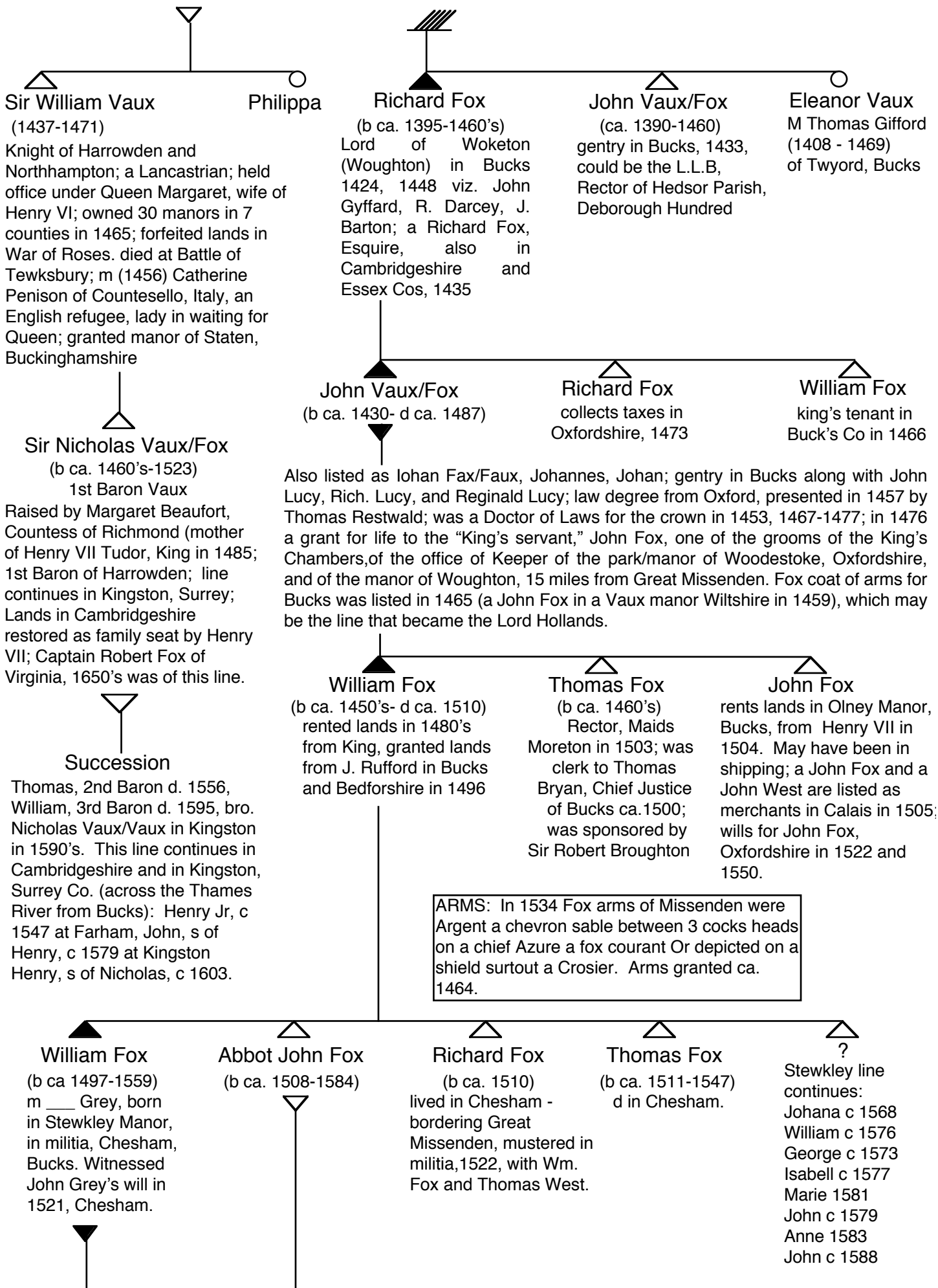
Harold de Vaux of Normandy

(b ca. 1010)

Norman; surname Vaux or Vallibus derived from lordship near F(V)alaise, Normandy; 4 Vaux brothers came to England with William the Conqueror in the Norman invasion of 1066. Held castle named de Vaux in Normandy until 1080. Was a mesne-lord in Norfolk, England in 1086 (*Domesday Book*), also possessed manor at Dalston, Cumberland, England.







(Abbot John Fox)

born and orphaned in Stewkley; Vicar of Great Missenden Parish, 1528 - 1538; Vicar of Stewkley Parish, 1545 - 1554, 1559 - 1583; m. in 1552; (sometimes confused with distant cousin Sir John Fox, Martyrologist, (1516-1587, b. Lincolnshire), author *Acts and Monuments in the Church* and *Martyrs* (1562-3, 3 vols; employed by Sir Thomas Lucy, Earl of Surrey, nephew of the Duchess of Richmond)

Fox b 1577 m 1606 Margaret Payne, moved to St. Dunstan's parish, Stepney; s. Robert m 1611 Maudlin Butlin.

gs. Capt. Edward Fox, ca 1607 - 1668, of Stepney, buys land in Charles City, Va, 1639. Moved to Yorke Co., Va, bought land in Gloucester Co. wrote letter to Duke of Richmond, business partner in 1668 (letter in British Museum).

ggs. John Fox (1628 - 1710), purchased land in Norfolk and Nanesmond Cos., Va 1670, 1672-3, 1698, in Prince George Co. In 1706, bro. Richard Fox, 1629 - 1670's, Rappohanock Co.

ggs. Richard, Jr. ca 1660 - 1706, Chowan, NC, related to Payne, Carew/Carey, and Walker families

gggs George, 1689 - 1711, Surry Co., Va. John, b. 1698, Prince George Co., shipbuilder in Chowan, NC, is sued for not following apprenticeship of shipbuilding, 1713.

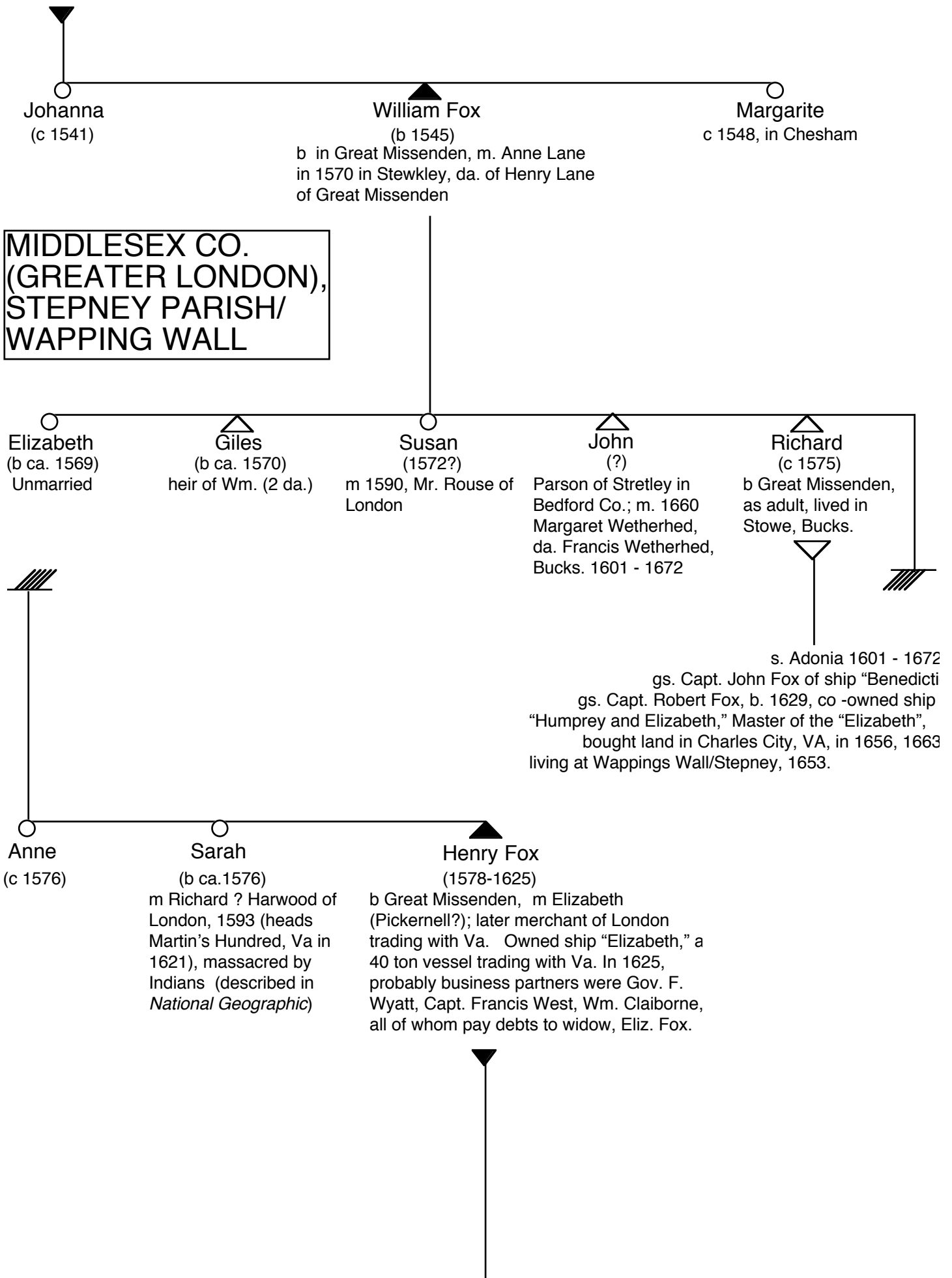

(c 1602-1665)

b Stepney Parish, heir of Henry. m Anne and Elizabeth Convers (sis. of John Convers), visited Jamestown, Va 1635 on ship "Transport" (Ed. Walker, Capt.), Church of England, Commander of "White Horse", "Currycombe", and "Thomas and Anne". In 1625 was in business with father for the "Elizabeth," d Stepney Parish.

(b ca 1626-1682/3)

c1632, St. Dunstan, d in Gloucester Co, Va. m 1) Anne (d Eng.), 2) Margaret Thomas, 1661, Stepney Parish. Capt. of "William and John," 1659, immigrated 1663 to New Kent Co on grant of 1000 acres made by King Charles II in 1661 (adjoined the plantation of John Lewis, ancestor, granted in 1667). John with docs of Capt. David Fox, Sr, of Lancaster Va, a cousin? Sir Stephen Fox (1627- 1716) of Wiltshire, a kinsman, was Treasurer for Charles II and may have facilitated the land grant. Capt. John Fox, Mariner, was awarded a levy by York Co, Va for "firing his great guns" to celebrate arrival of Charles II in England, was also in the service of Charles II. [A John Fox of Wiltshire, bro. of Sir Stephen Fox, was also in the service of Charles II during exile in France. Sir Stephen Fox, 1st, Lord of Holland, was the ancestor of Charles James Fox (late 1700s), Prime Minister of Great Britain].

(c 1629, d in infancy)

Parish church of St. Dunstant and All Saints, which still stands in Stepney on a hill overlooking the River Thames and the wharf area, is over 1000 years old. "Saint Dunstan dedicated a church on the same site. It is the mother church of the East End of London and became known as the Church of the High Seas. For this reason the redensign is till flown from the tower which also houses the famous ten bells of Stepney, mentioned in the nursery rhyme, Oranges and Lemons...In each generation large numbers from this community have gone out to the four corners of the world..." from sign on front of the church. A 17th century sailing ship and a gargoyle adorn the upper corners of the front door jamb.
